Review: Longshot layered foam boss


I have a garden large enough in which to shoot safely. My archery muscles have suffered from my long spell of not shooting so I wanted to practise regularly. I dragged my old straw boss out of my garage together with the stand. It seemed to be fine. Then after shooting several ends successfully I went to retrieve my arrows and found there were only five not six. But I had heard six hits. Had an arrow gone right through the boss? Yes, there it was lying behind on the ground with damaged fletchings.

So it was off to Clickers for a foam boss. I thought of getting a Danage foam block one but they seemed quite expensive for the garden. So I settled for the Longshot 95 cm layered foam one that you see in the picture. It only cost £129 and fitted in my car, so avoiding a large delivery charge. The bad news is that I bought the last one so there might be a wait.



At 17 kg it is light enough to move around quite easily, especially with a sack barrow.. More important though, because of its square base it doesn't need a stand. I shot from my 17 kg (37 lb) draw weight recurve at 20 m expecting the boss to topple but it didn't. I guess the arrows are stopped more slowly than on a straw boss so they don't impose such a large force. Remember force = mass x acceleration? I don't know if it would topple with a faster or heavier arrow from a compound bow. Overall then, an excellent and highly recommended piece of kit. Don't forget you are not insured for shooting in your garden.

Books: Longbow



This is several books in one. It covers the history of the bow in general, the development of the longbow, how it was in used in various wars, the people who became military archers, a description of creating working replicas of military longbows, the emergence of archery as a sport and several accounts of the science of archery. Robert Hardy was a well-known actor and had a long-term interest in the history of the bow. He was a trustee for the project to raise and preserve the Mary Rose, one of Henry VIII's warships. One discovery when the ship was lifted was a large number of unused longbows in storage together with thousands of

arrows. The book is painstaking in its detail and accuracy so don't expect an exciting read. If you are a keen archer there will be plenty in this book for you. There are lots of excellent pictures, and it is an education in itself just to flick through looking at them.

I particularly liked one quote from Hardy about the sometime mismatch between humans and machines. "[The bow gives us] ... the ability to store the slow energy of the ... muscles and release it suddenly and efficiently..." (P11). This is very much like the relationship of humans to computers and the role of computer software. When I trained programmers I used to tell them that they would write very clever code very slowly that the incredibly stupid computer would run blindingly fast.
